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PETERSBURG BOROUGH - BALLOT PROPOSITIONS PROPOSITION #1 **General Obligation Bonds Public School Capital Improvements** (Assembly Ordinance #2024-12) Shall the Petersburg Borough incur long-term indebtedness, and issue up to the principal amount not to exceed Three Million Five Hundred Thousand dollars (\$3,500,000) of general obligation bonds? Proceeds of the general obligation bonds will be used to finance costs of major maintenance to areawide public school facilities including roof replacement/repair at both the Mitkof Middle School and Petersburg High School, security and safety features and upgrades to the Borough's public schools and related capital improvements, and also includes paying incidental costs incurred in connection with carrying out and financing such improvements and costs incidental to the issuance of the bonds. The indebtedness would be in the form of general obligation bonds, payable from ad valorem taxes levied on all taxable property located within the Borough. The Borough will pledge its full faith and credit for repayment Voter approval of this bond proposition authorizes for each \$100,000 of assessed taxable real and personal property value in the Borough (based on the estimated FY 2025 areawide assessed valuation) an annual increase in taxes of approximately \$62.00 to retire the proposed bonds. O No **PROPOSITION #2** Increasing the Maximum Sales Tax that can be Collected on a Single Purchase of Goods or Services from \$72 to \$300. (Assembly Ordinance #2024-10) Shall Paragraphs D and E of Section 4.28.120, *Exemptions*, of the Borough Code be amended to increase the maximum sales tax that can be collected on a single purchase of goods or services from \$72 to \$300? This change would affect only transactions over \$1,200. If this proposition is approved, the maximum amount of a transaction that is subject to the Borough's 6% sales tax would increase from \$1,200 to \$5,000, thus increasing the maximum sales tax due from \$72 to \$300. The Assembly proposes this sales tax modification to help offset an increase to future property taxes. Yes O No **PROPOSITION #3** Increasing the Transient Room Tax Rate to Seven Percent (7%) (Assembly Ordinance #2024-07) The Petersburg Borough currently levies a four percent (4%) tax on transient hotel room rentals, defined as a person staying in a hotel, motel or other lodging for fewer than 30 days. This rate has been in place since October of 1997. Under the Borough code (PMC 4.33.060), these tax revenues are used for visitor-related marketing and support of visitor-related Borough infrastructure and services. This proposition, if approved by the voters, would increase the transient room tax rate to seven percent (7%) and is projected to generate an additional \$53,000 in Borough tax revenue. Shall the Borough increase the transient room tax rate to seven percent (7%)? Yes O No **PROPOSITION #4** Authorization to Incur Long-Term Indebtedness through ADEC Loans for Water and Wastewater Infrastructure Capital Projects (Assembly Ordinance #2024-13) Shall the Petersburg Borough be authorized to incur long-term indebtedness, in a total principal amount not to exceed Nineteen Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$19,300,000), for the purposes of permitting, designing and constructing capital projects of the water and wastewater enterprises? This indebtedness would be a revenue obligation of the water and wastewater enterprises only. The indebtedness would be in the form of loans from the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation (ADEC), with a term not to exceed 20 years, and with an anticipated annual interest rate of 1.5% or as

otherwise established under the ADEC Municipal Loan Program.
